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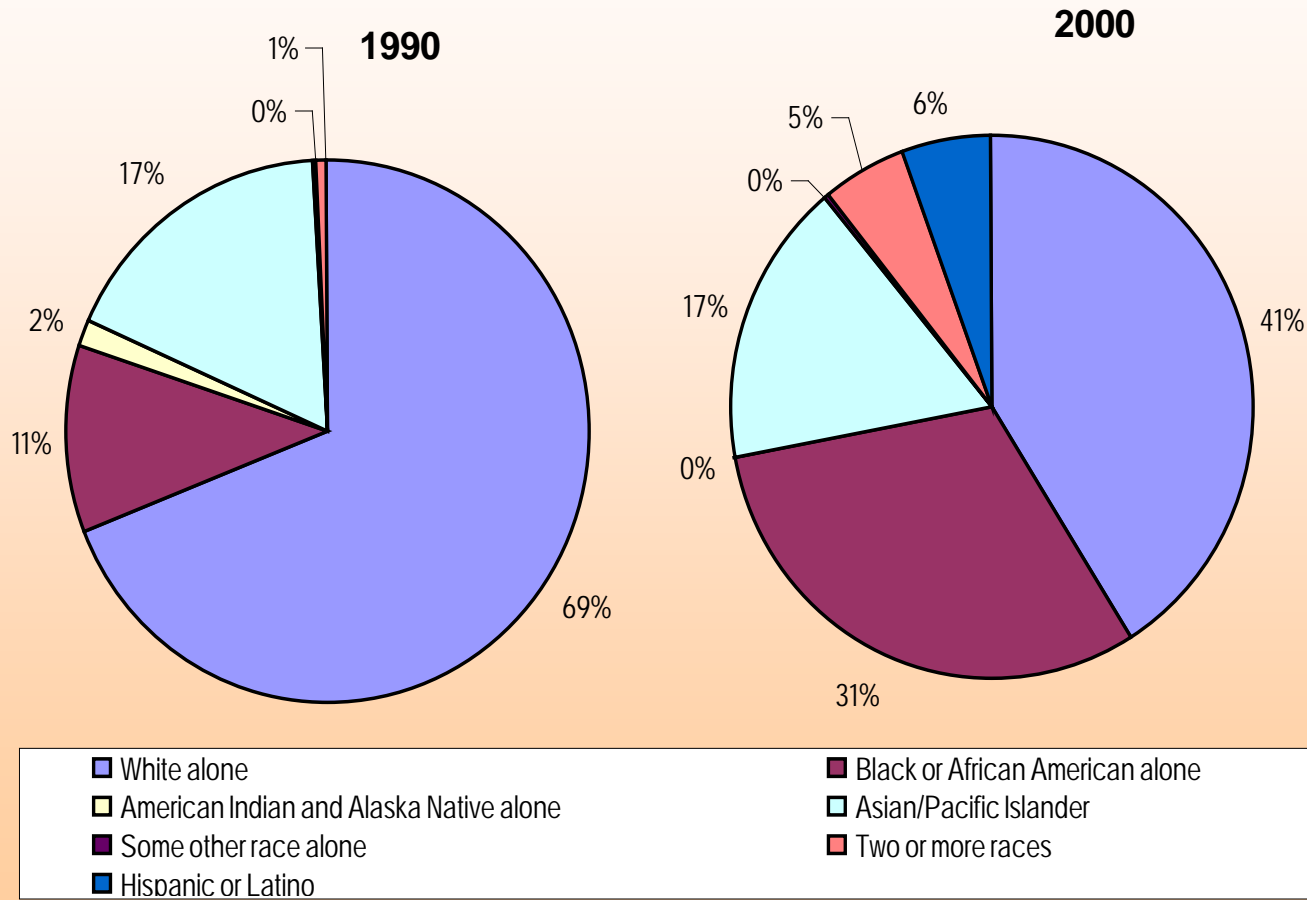

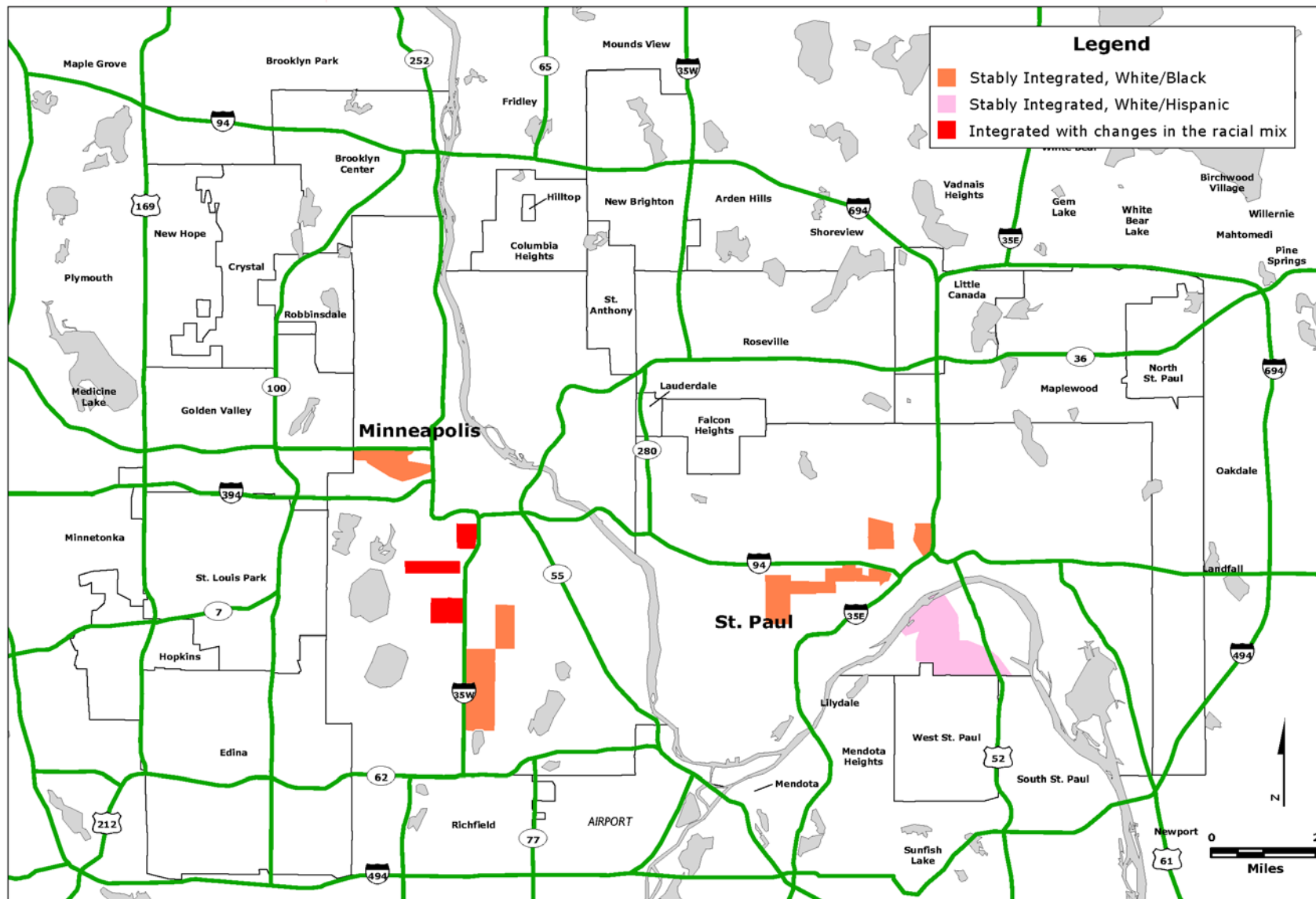
Cedar / Riverside Race and Ethnicity, 1990-2000

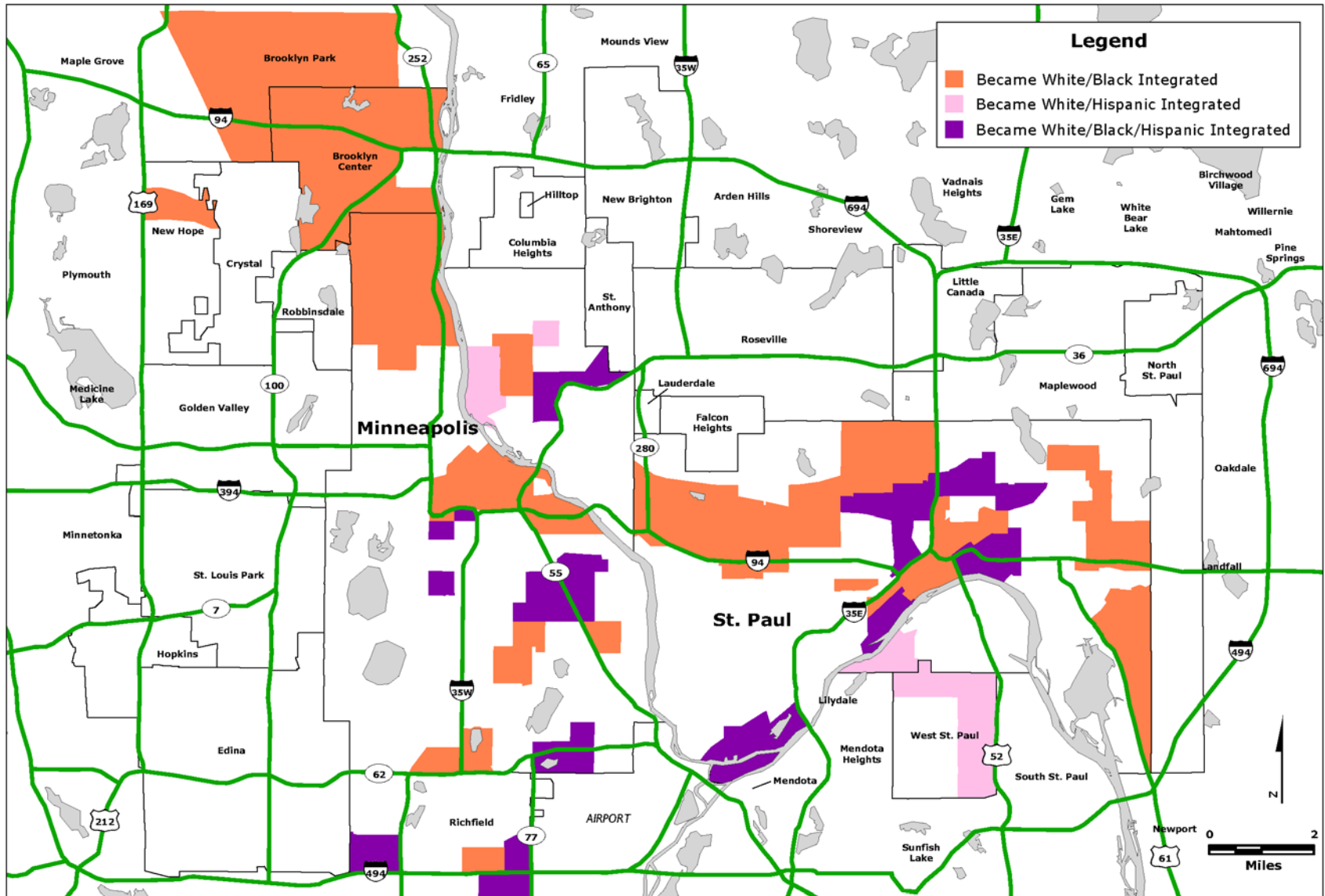

Integrated Neighborhoods: 1980 through 2000



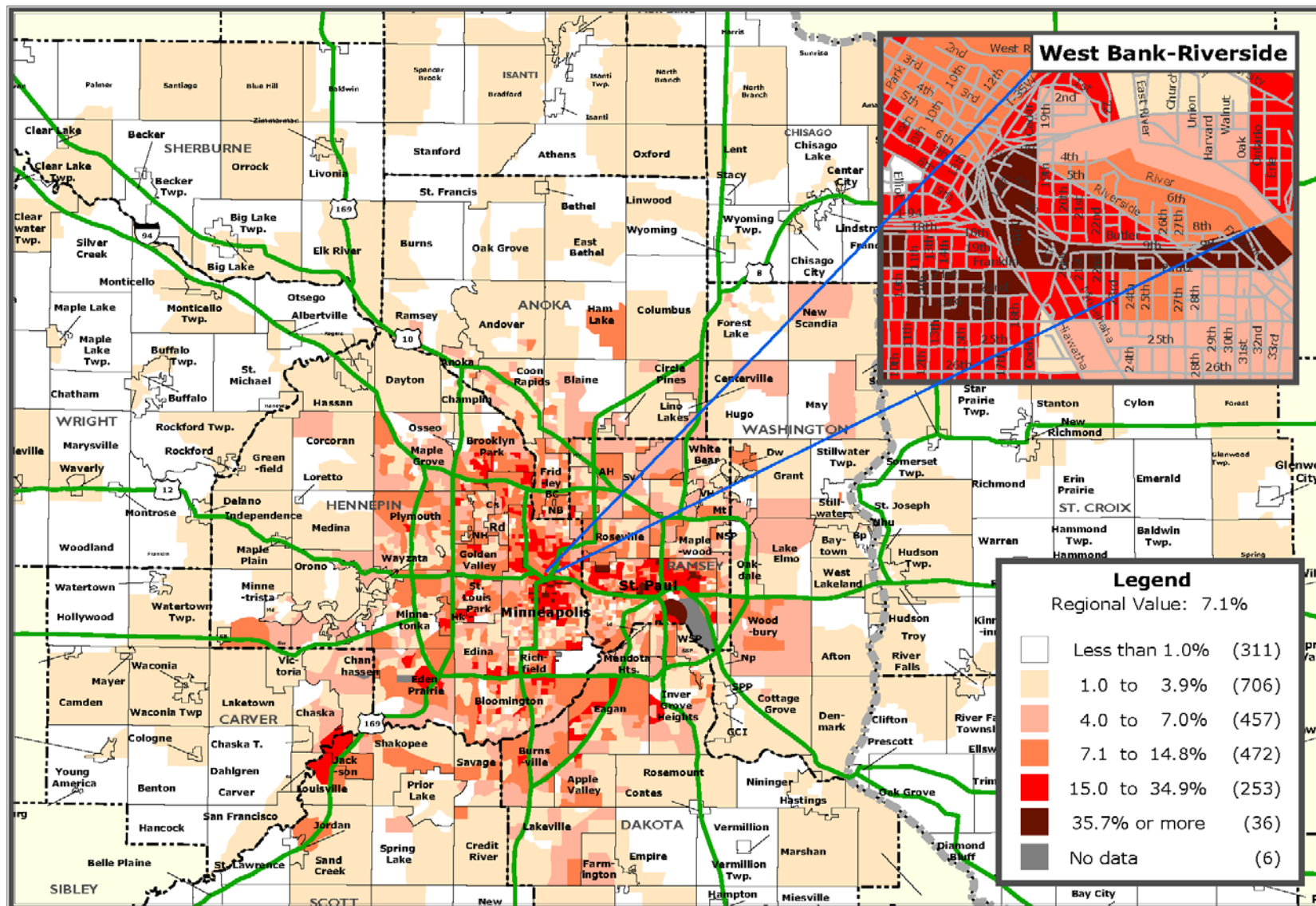

Neighborhoods that Integrated between 1980 and 2000



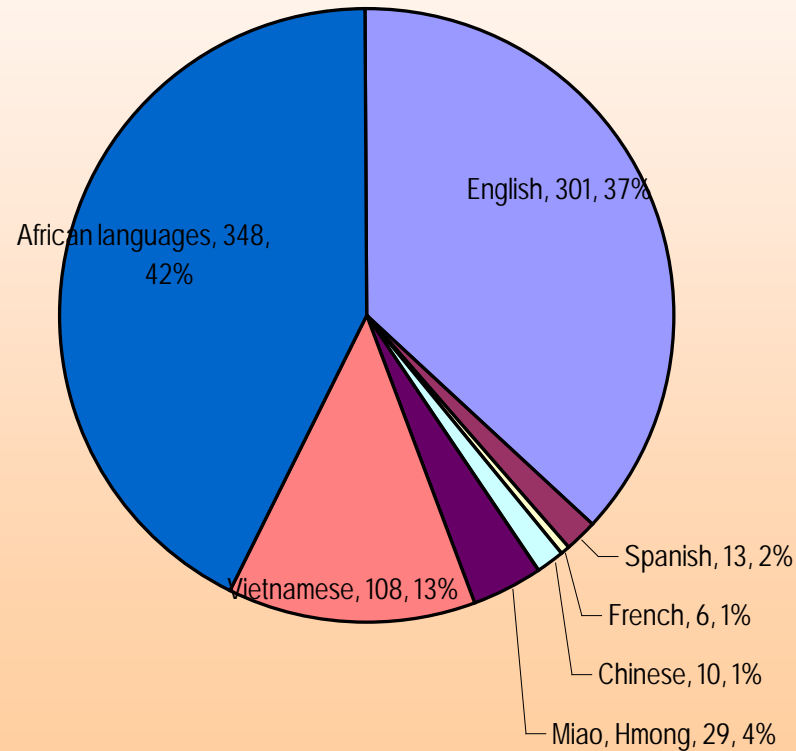

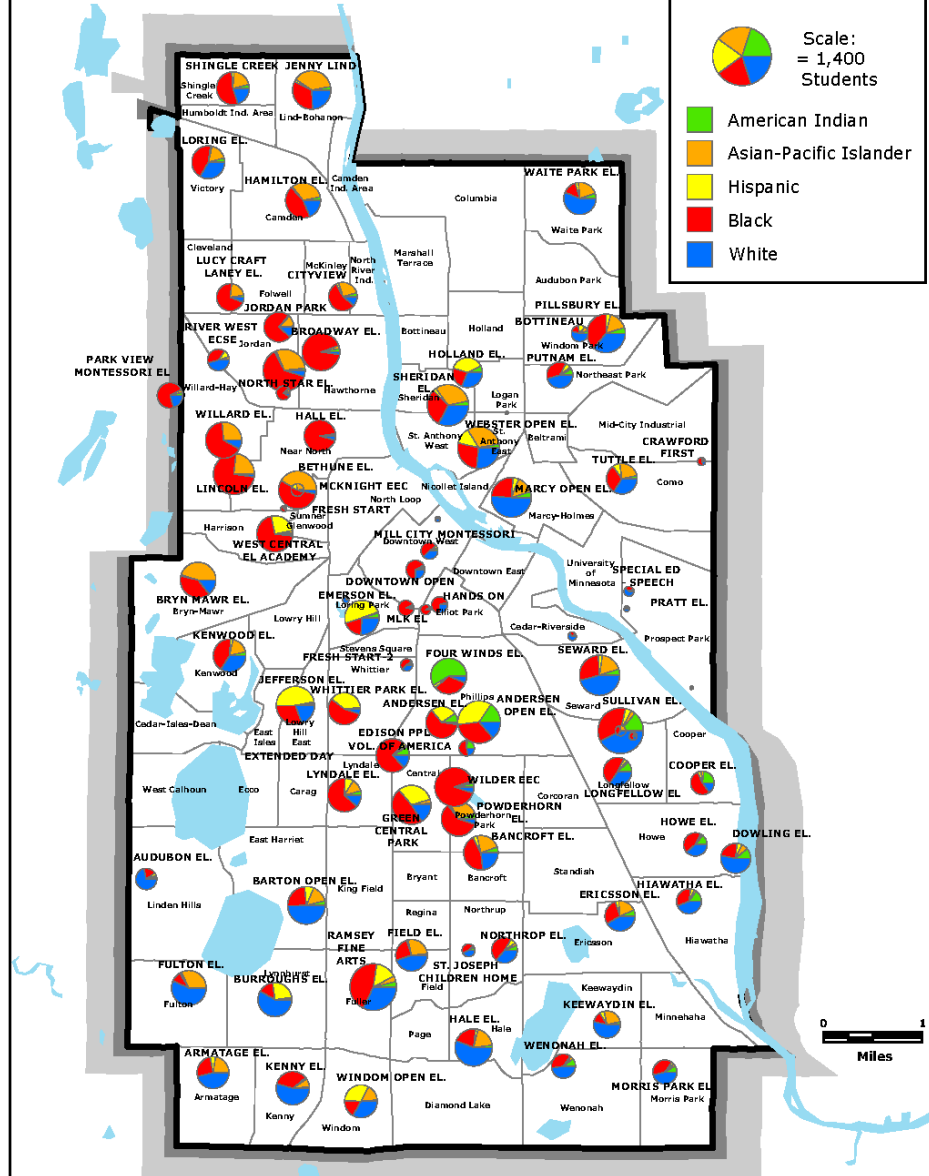
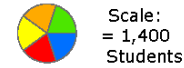


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Minneapolis Public Elementary Schools Race and Ethnicity, 1999-2000

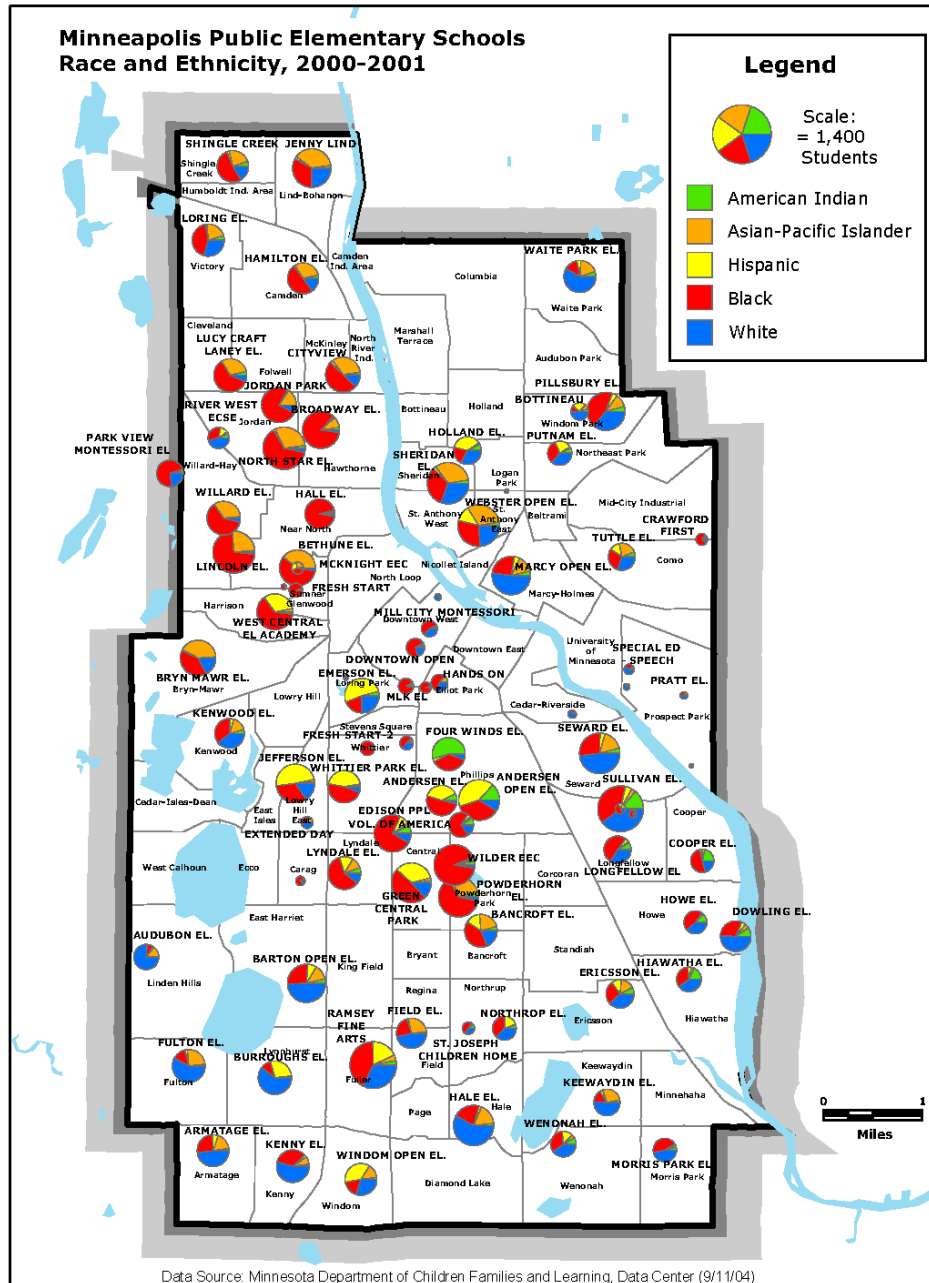
Minneapolis Public Elementary Schools Race and Ethnicity, 2000-2001

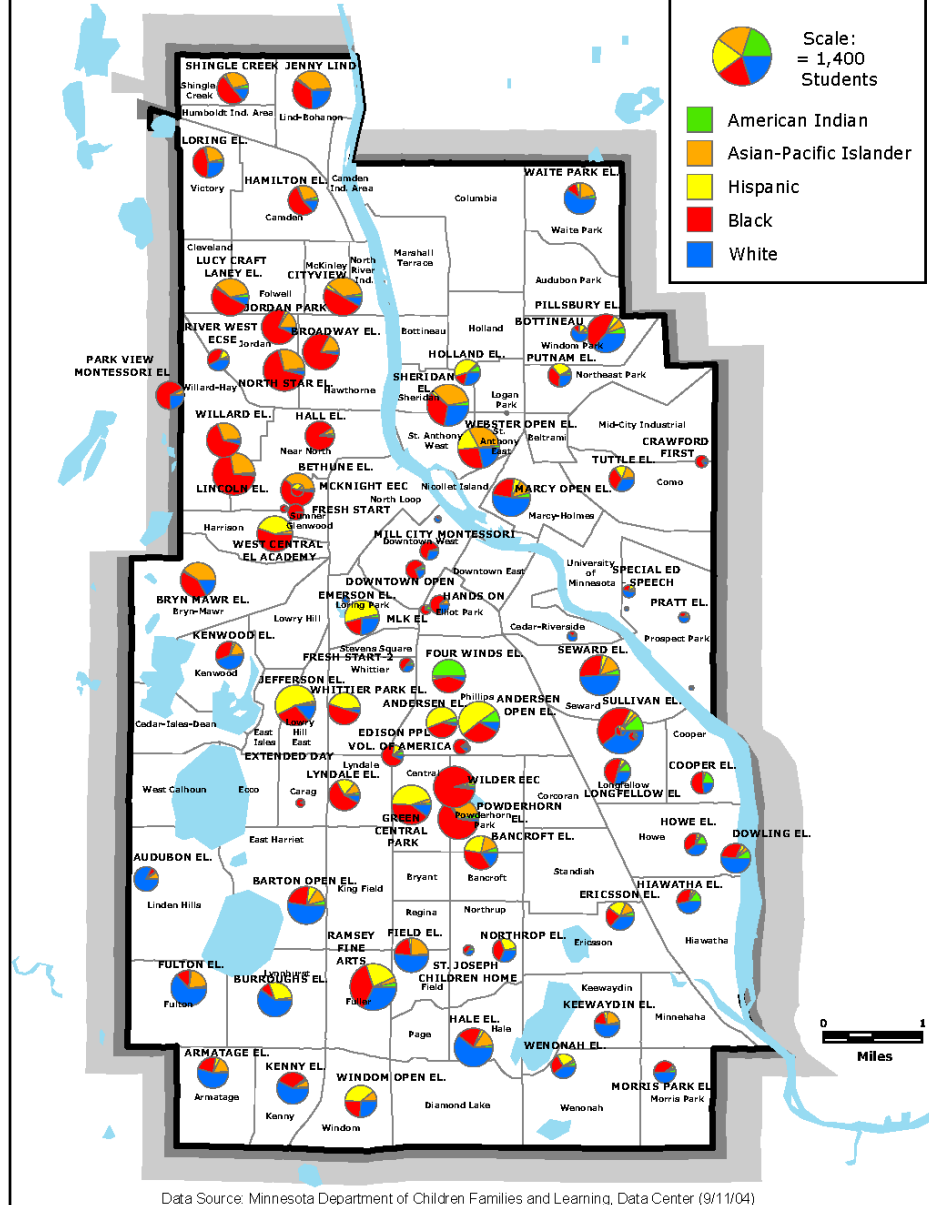

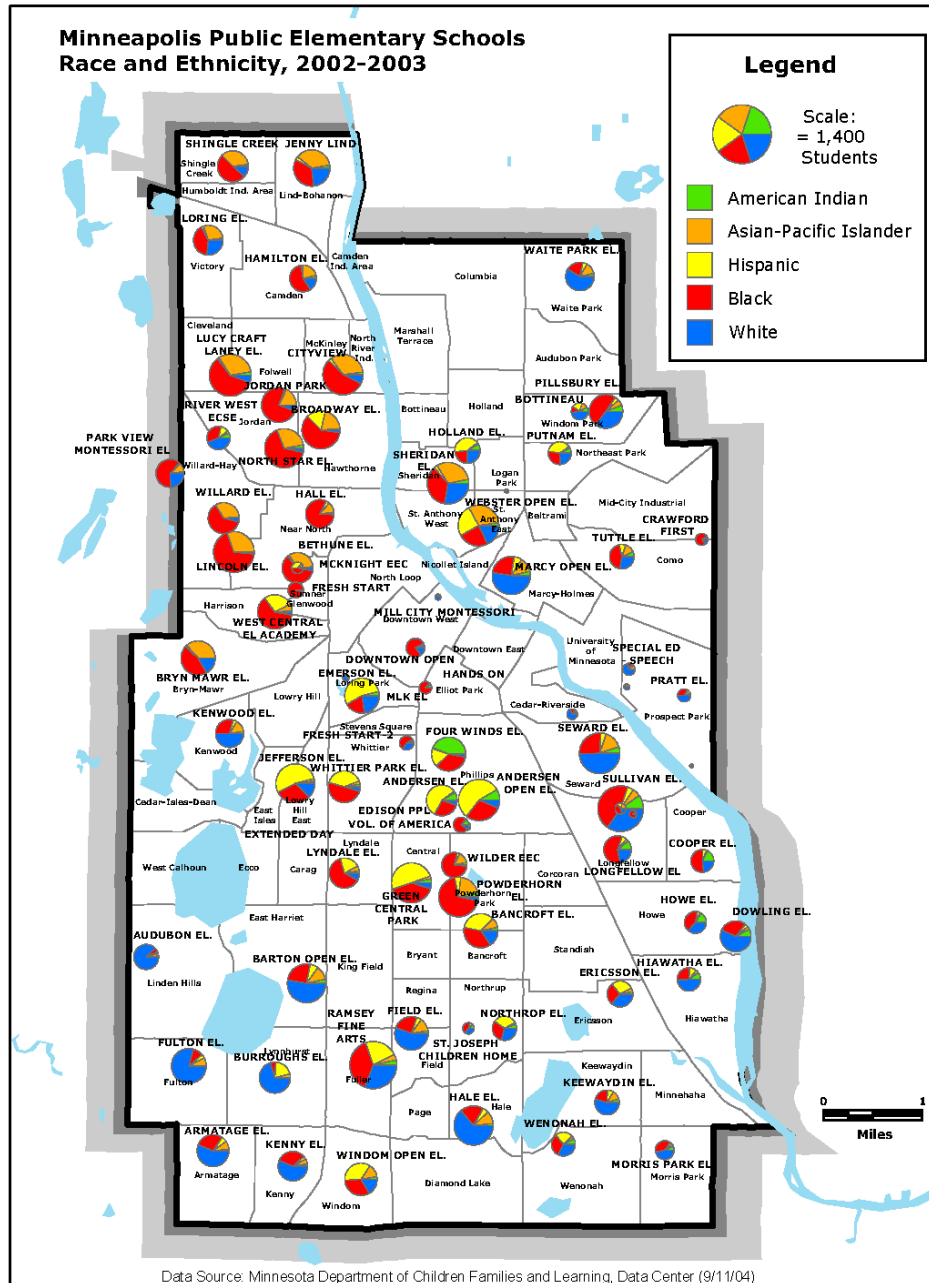

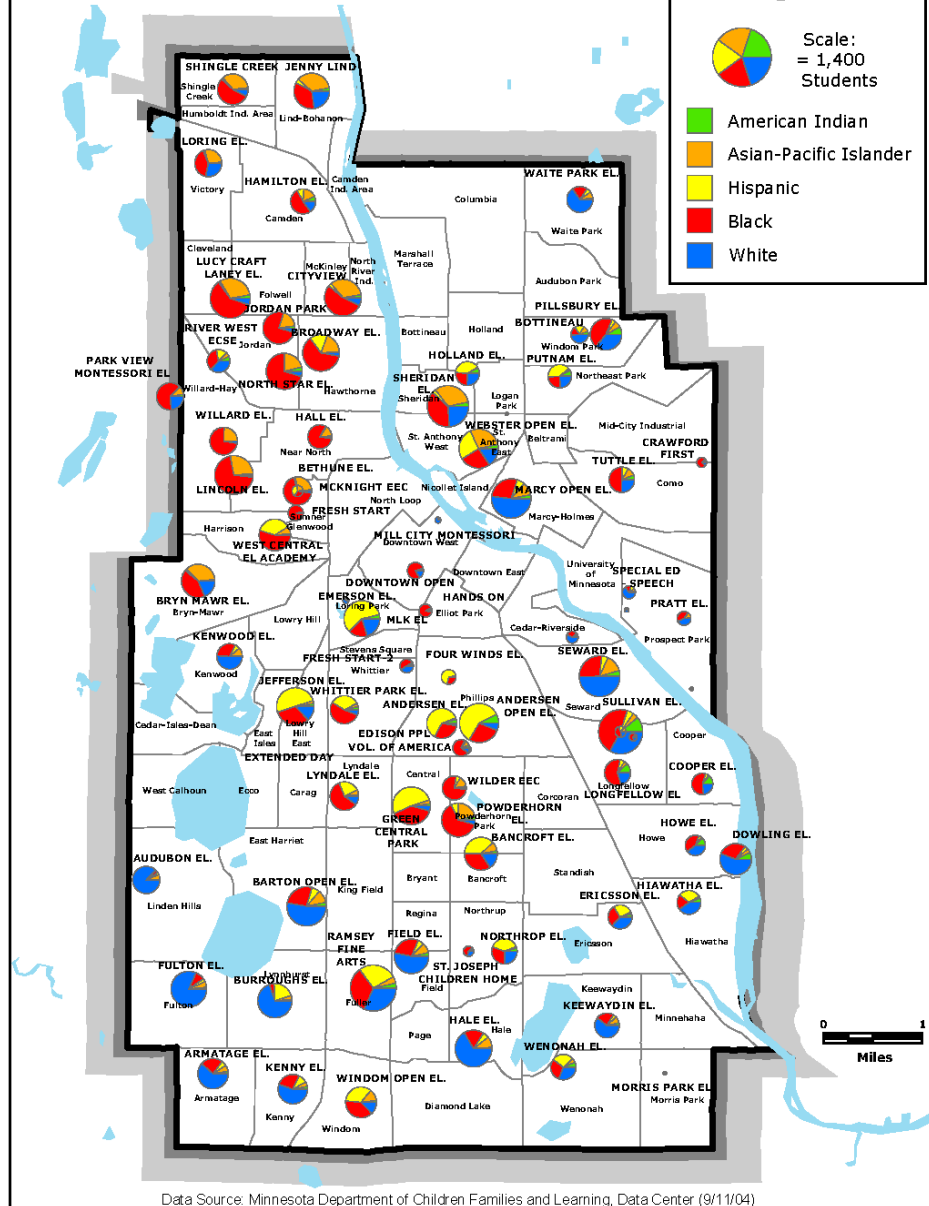
Minneapolis Public Elementary Schools Race and Ethnicity, 2003-2004

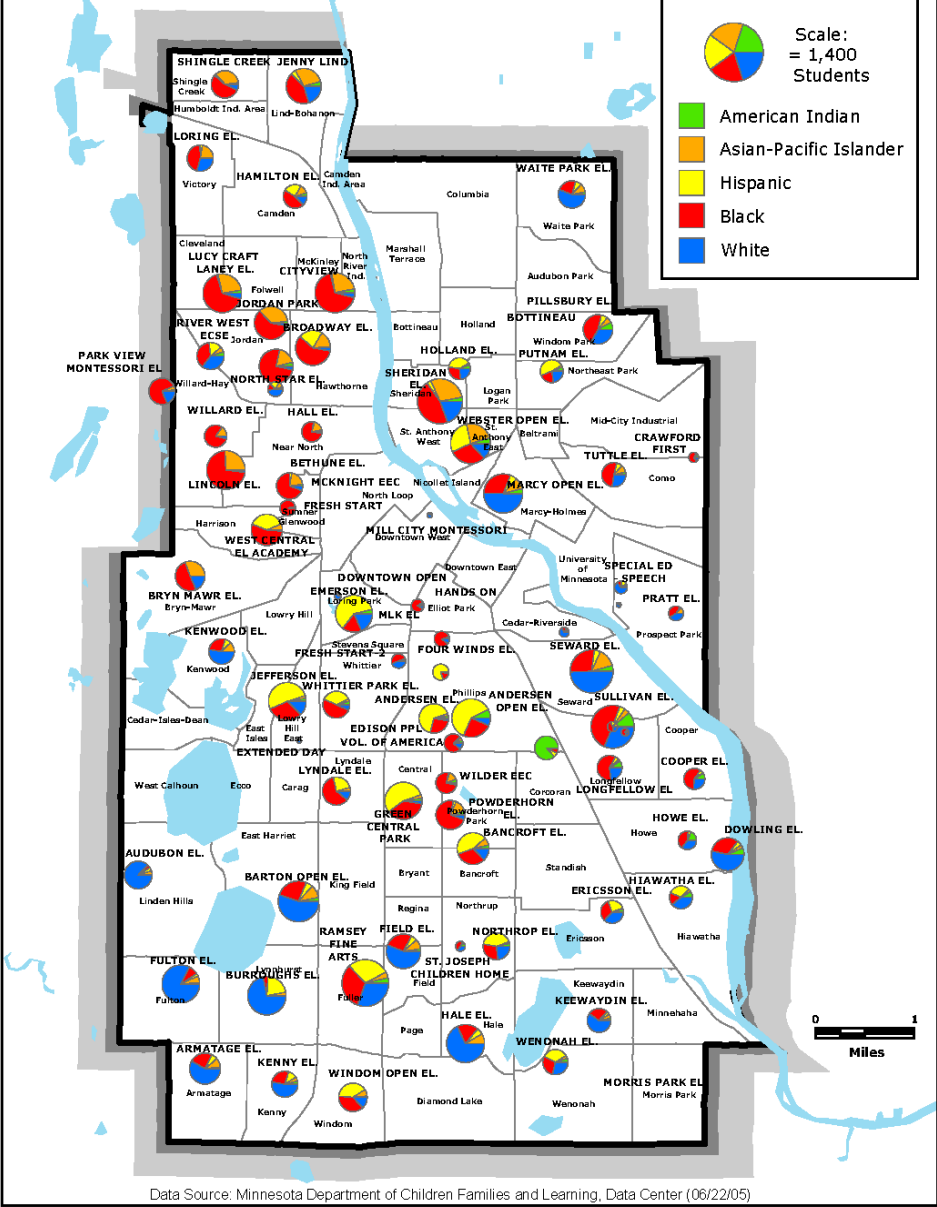

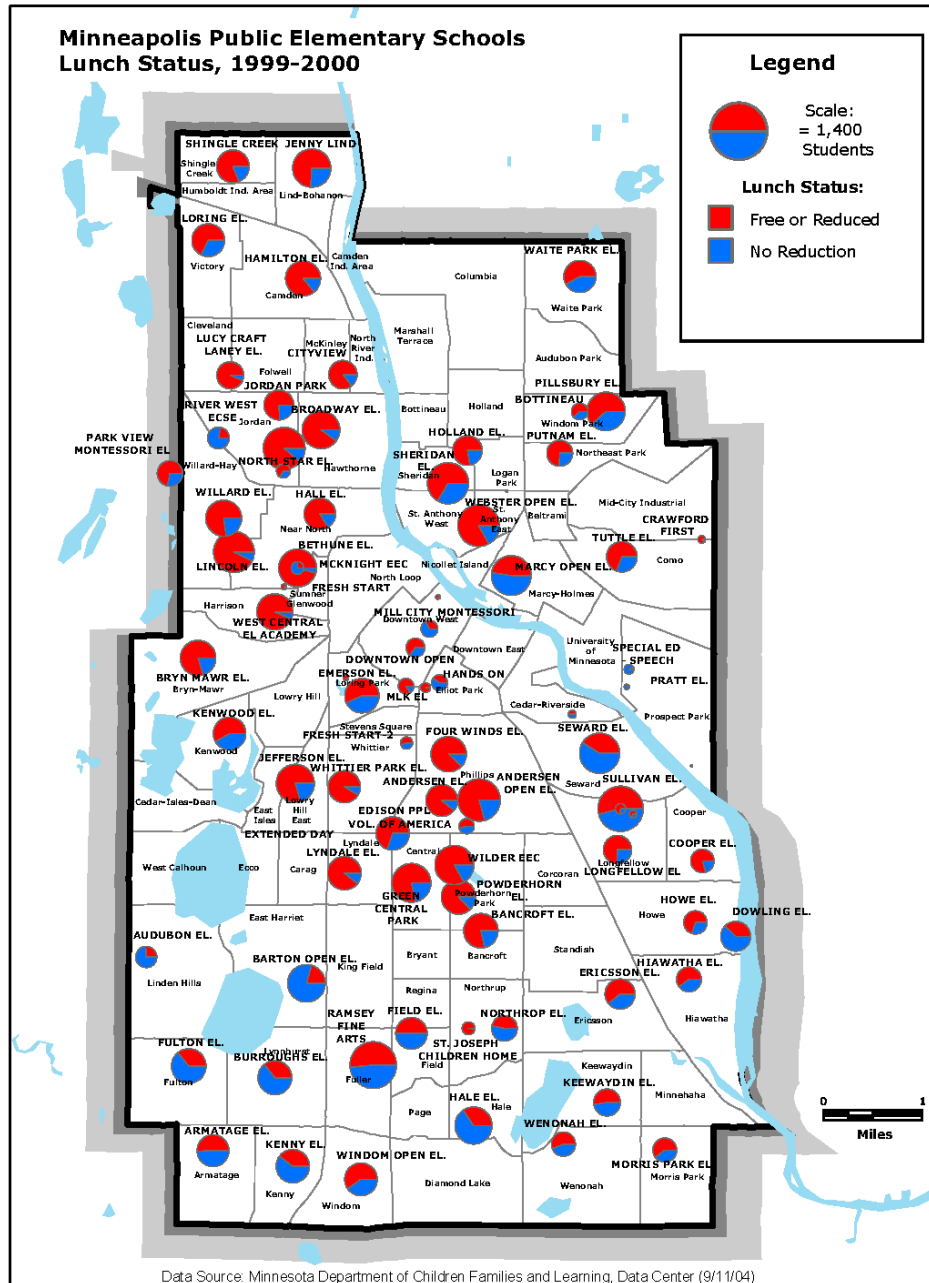

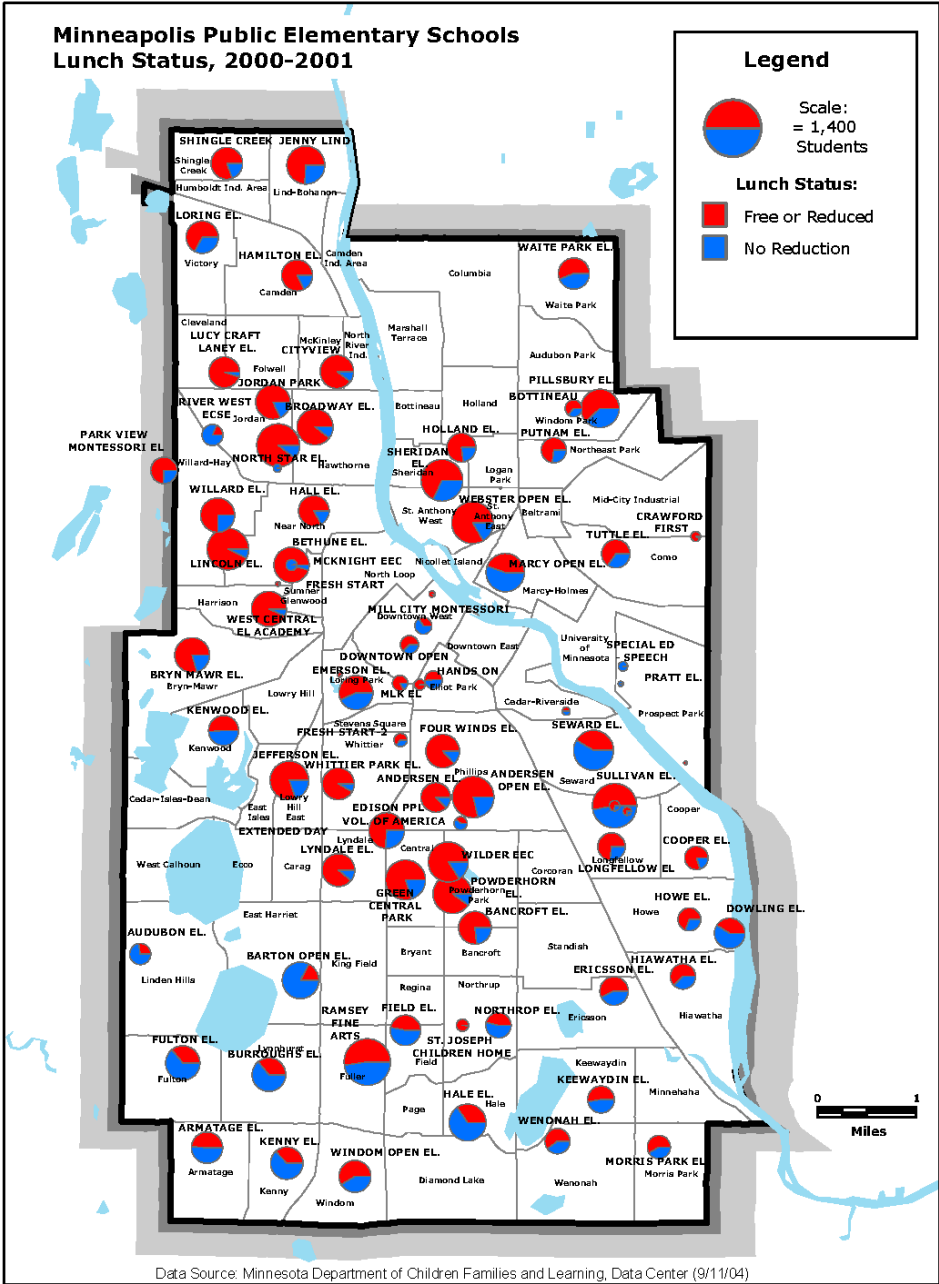

Minneapolis Public Elementary Schools Lunch Status, 1999-2000

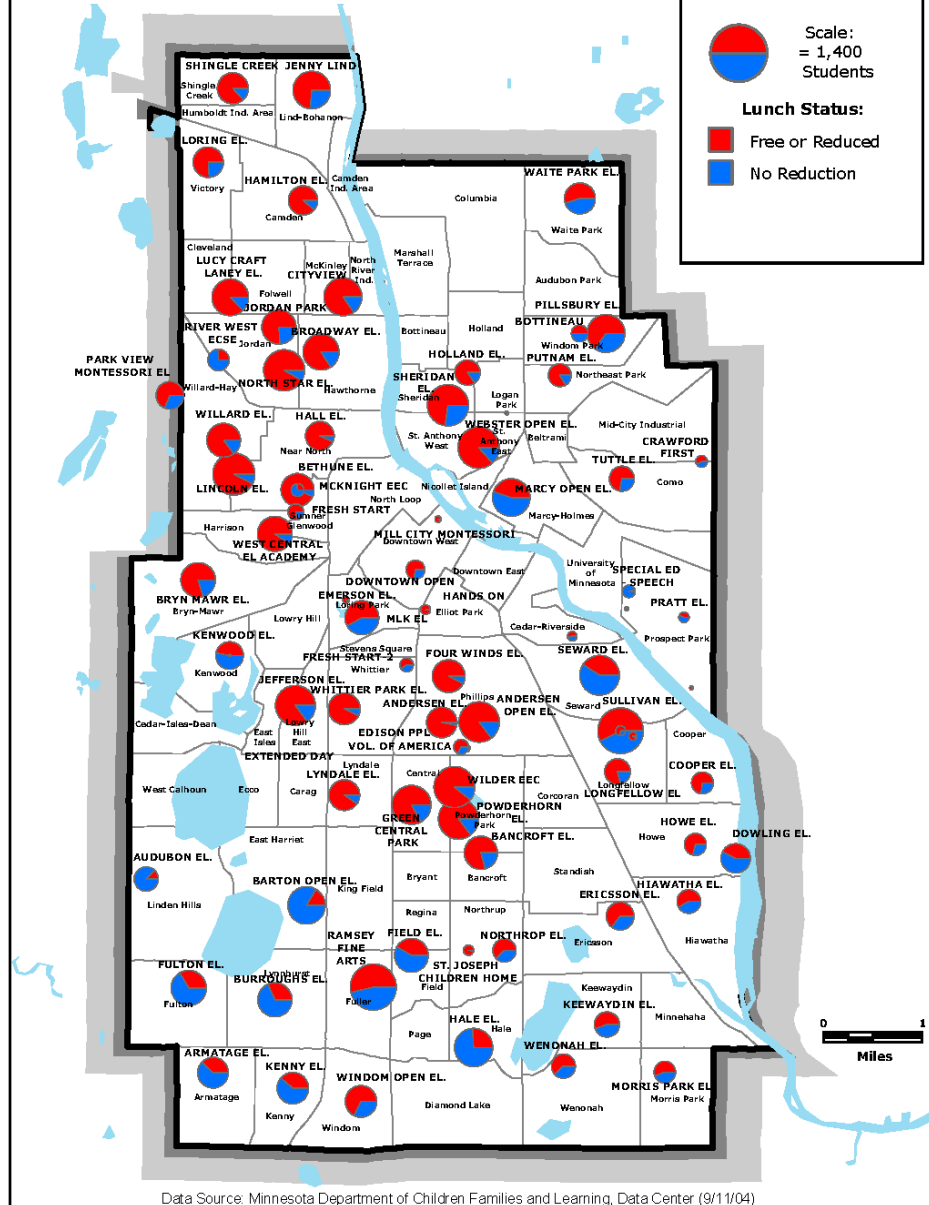
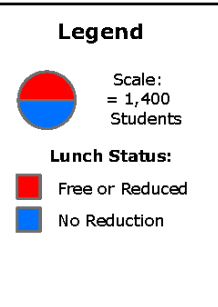


Minneapolis Public Elementary Schools Lunch Status, 2000-2001



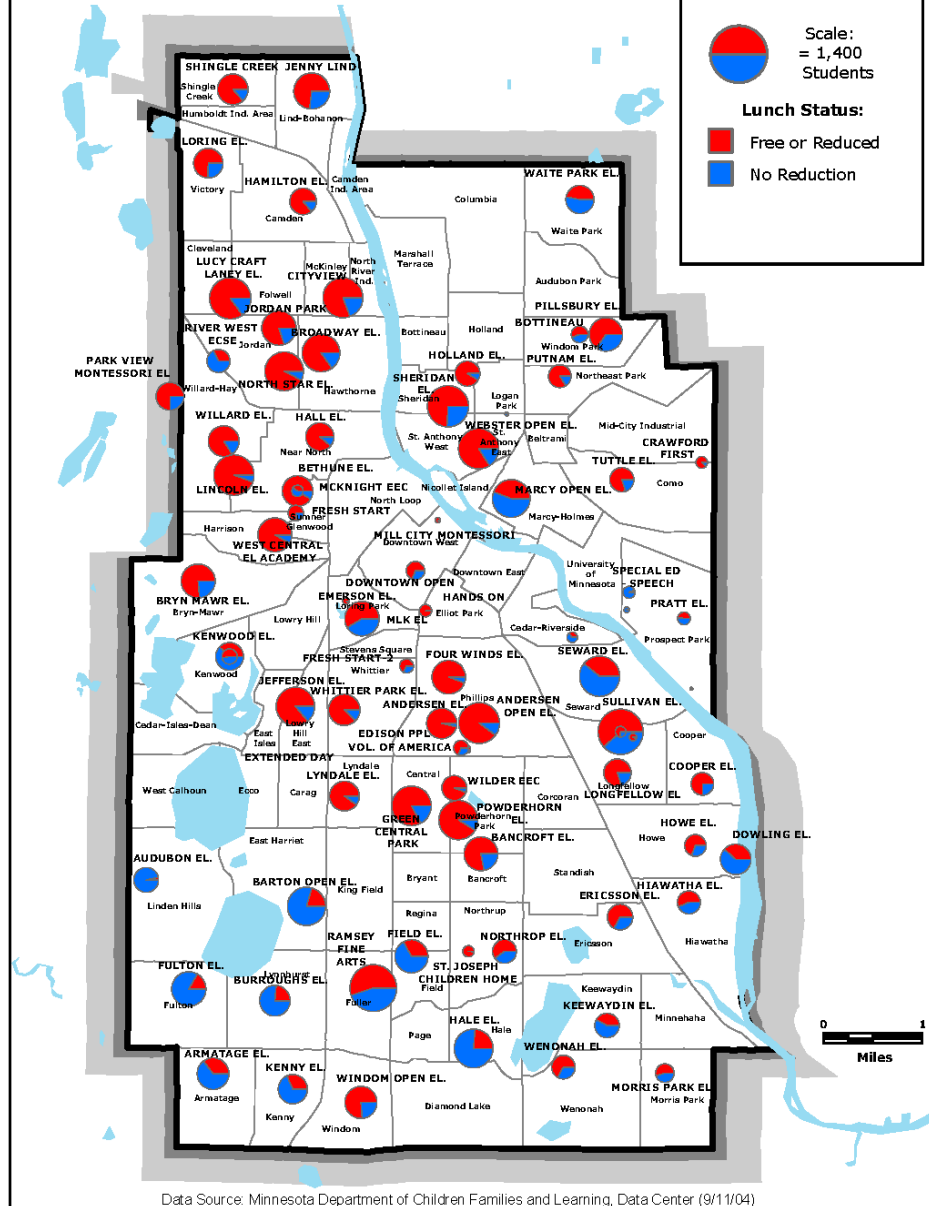
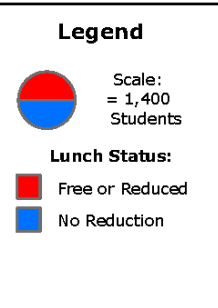

Minneapolis Public Elementary Schools Lunch Status, 2001-2002



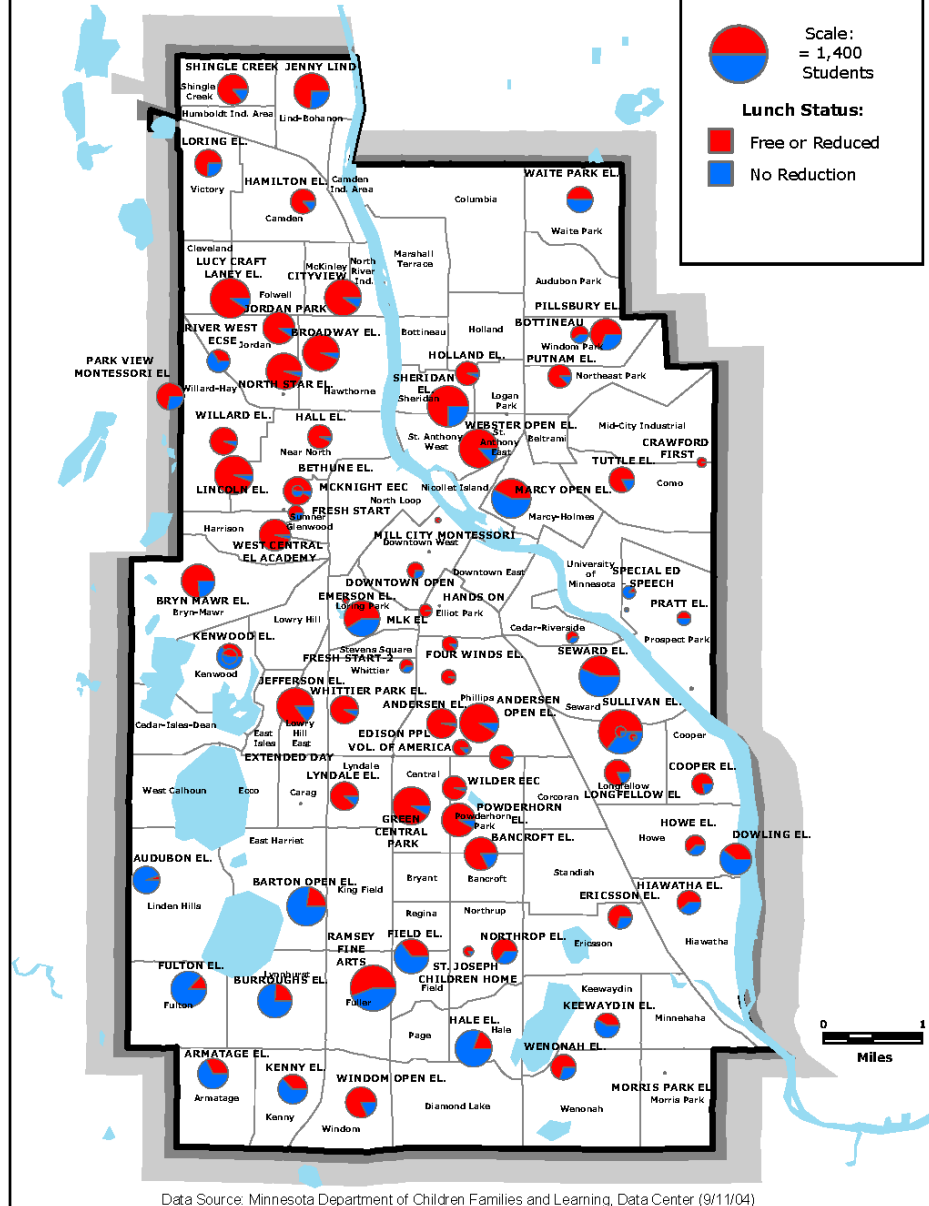
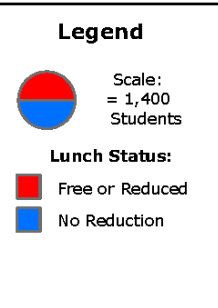

Minneapolis Public Elementary Schools Lunch Status, 2002-2003



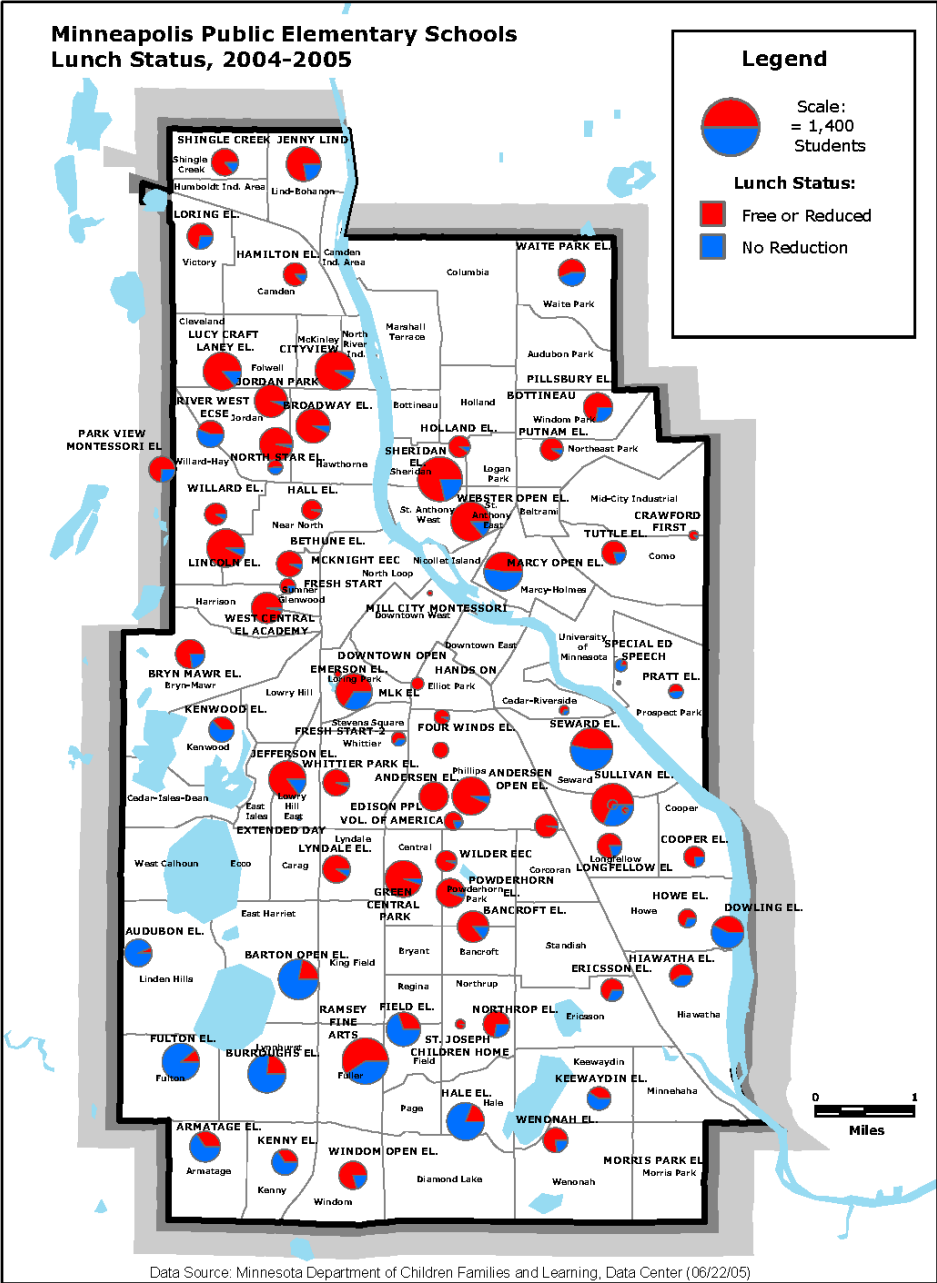

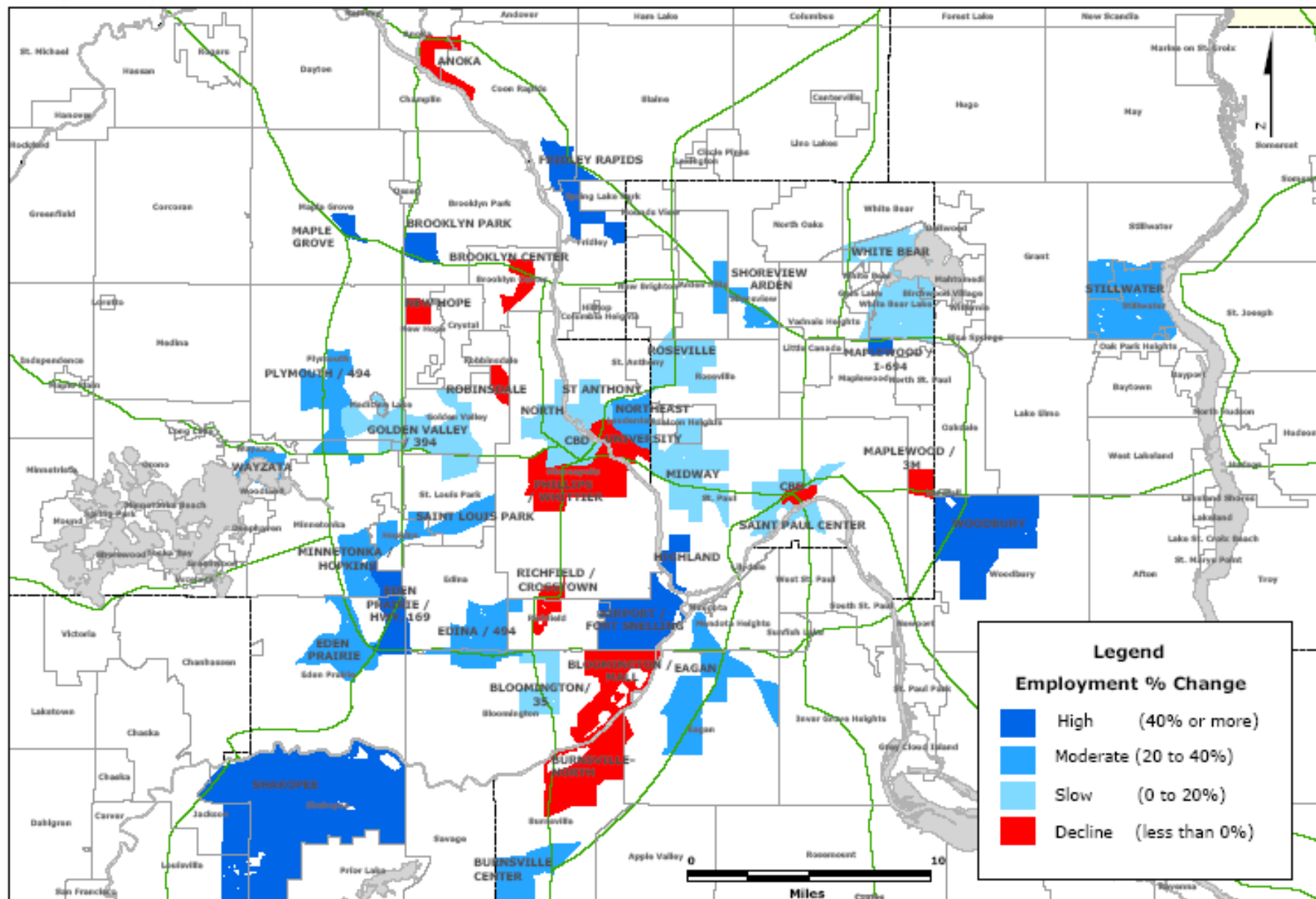

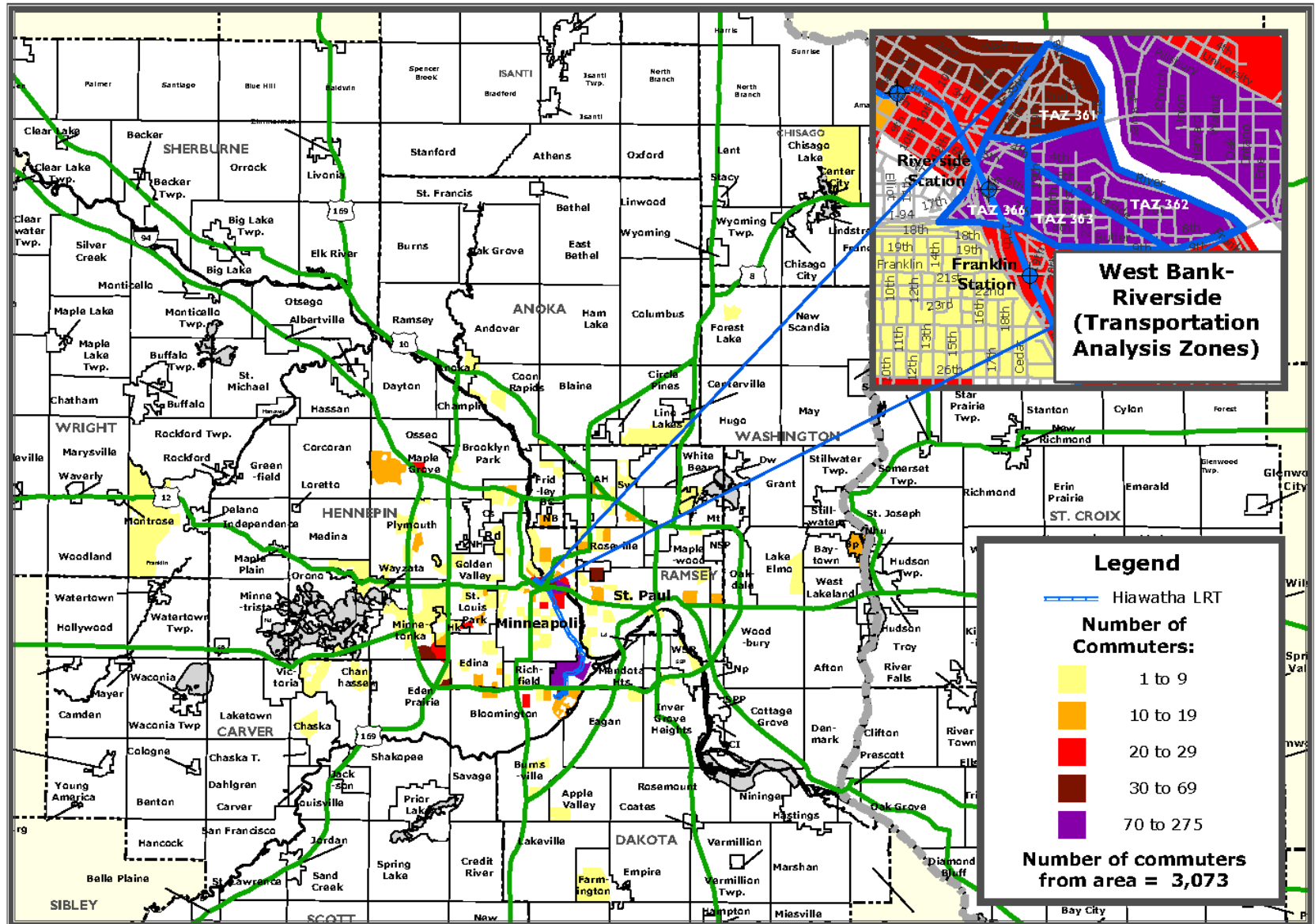

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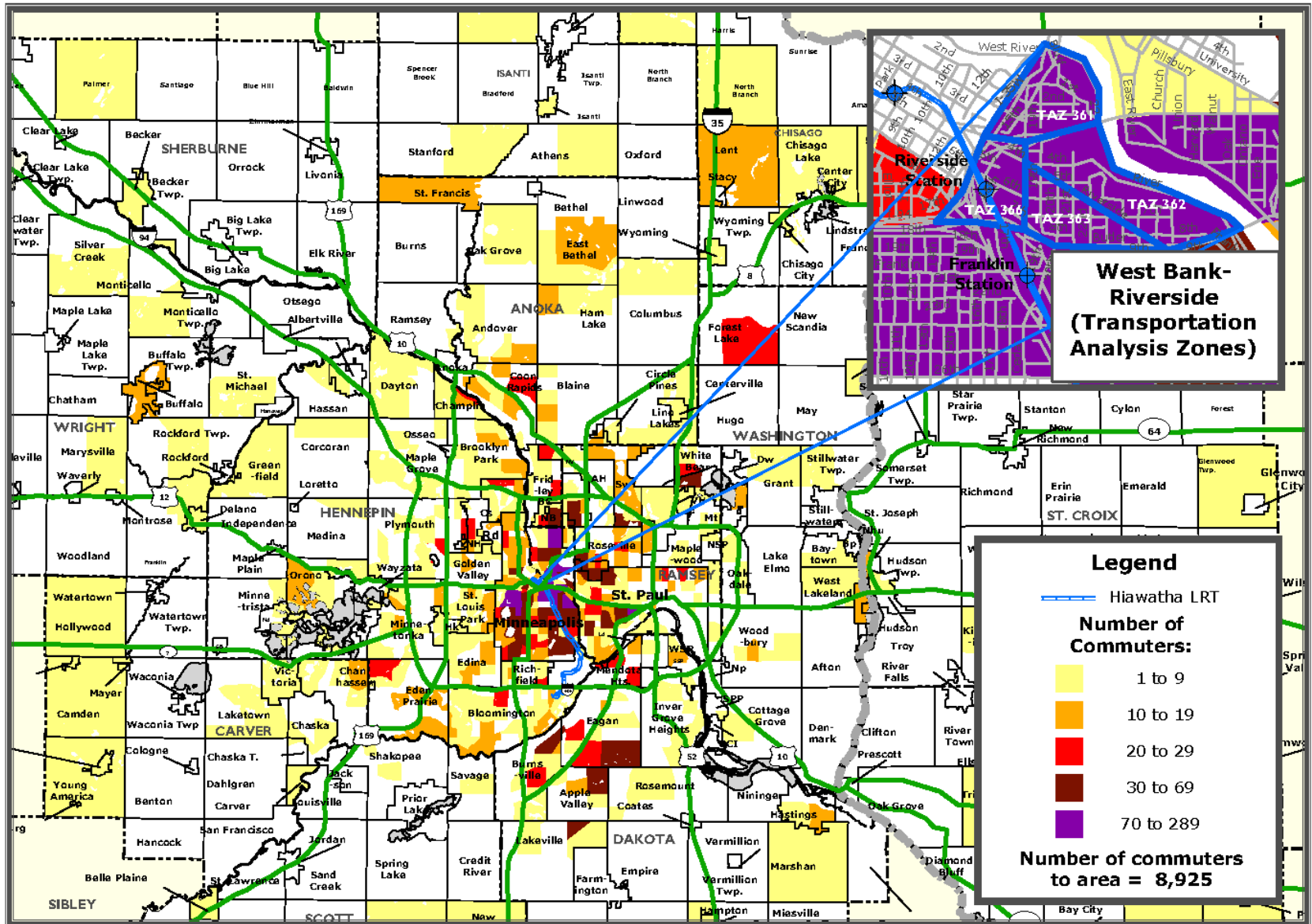
